DESCRIPTION OF COURSE

This course is an introductory drawing course for architecture students. This course emphasizes the process of freehand drawing techniques and the objectives of artistic presentation. Graphic representation from **observation** and **creative interpretation** of objects, figures, architectural/artistic buildings and nature will be the subject matter and essence of this course.

Class lessons will consist of: drawing the figure in a space, figure/ground; discussion and explanation of measurements and proportions; & analysis of negative/positive space. Various drawing exercises and homework utilizing the above subject matter in the city of Florence will be assigned each week. Each lesson has a specific aim and forms part of a progressive build up of skills. Since observation is the key to learning how to draw, learning how to see is fundamental to the entire artistic process.

Form, value, line and proportions will be studied and analyzed as means of determining space, shape, volume and composition.

Analysis of the structure of the composition: in its whole, in detail and in relationship between the details.

The class format will consist of lectures, exercises and review of master artist drawings.

COURSE EVALUATION

Evaluation is based on individual response to the exercises in class as well as on the entire body of work, including homework and all work completed during the course. **Attendance is mandatory.**

Students are required to do two (2) final project drawings, which will be presented at the Final Group Critique for the final grade. Final Projects are based on observation and not on concept. NO PHOTO-GRAPHS ARE TO BE USED. Only direct observation of the subject matter. THE FINAL PROJECTS ARE TO BE COMPLETED OUT OF CLASS. THEY ARE HOMEWORK ASSIGNMENTS.
