For those interested there will be new publications (essays, magazines), websites, contests and film festivals, cultural activities of various kinds related to the cinema.

Textbook required: "Italian Cinema from Neorealism to the Present" by Peter Bondanella

Students are required to attend and participate in each lesson, as well as read selected chapters from the text "Italian Cinema from Neorealism to the Present" by Peter Bondanella.

“3 – Hour” Attendance Policy 2017-2018 (for classes that meet once a week for 3 hours)

Attendance to all CSU courses is mandatory. One unexcused absence is allowed during the semester but more than one unexcused absence will lower your grade as follows (excused absences will be accepted for serious medical reasons or emergencies): **TWO** unexcused absences, lowers by 1.5 letter grades (i.e., B to C-); **THREE** unexcused absences, lowers by 3 letter grades (i.e., A to D).
