Course description

This course focuses on the study of more advanced grammar structures and vocabulary of Italian aimed to provide students with the ability to move from familiar material to more complex constructions, backed by a more nuanced understanding and ability to understand several aspects of Italian culture. We will study grammar units, drills, and conversation on topics based on the grammar units. In addition to regular exercises, students will be asked to submit short written compositions to consolidate their writing and research skills. Homework will be either checked in class or completed at home.

Learning objectives

Students will consolidate and develop their vocabulary. They will study grammatical and syntactic structures of different complexity. Learners will work on their written and oral skills.

Learning outcomes

At the end of the semester students will be able to speak Italian with sufficient structural accuracy and vocabulary in order to satisfy social and practical needs. They will be able to discuss on the topics covered throughout the course. Learners will also be able to manage and understand different kinds of inputs.

Grades and exams

Your grade will be determined by the following assignments:

- Tests (test 1, midterm, test 3) 30 %
- Final 35 %

CSU ATTENDANCE POLICY 2018-2019

General Attendance Policy 2018-2019 (for classes that meet twice a week)

Attendance to all CSU courses is mandatory. Two unexcused absences are allowed during the semester but more than two unexcused absences will lower your grade (excused absences will be accepted for serious medical reasons or emergencies) as follows: 3 unexcused absences, lowers one letter grade; 4 unexcused absences, lowers two letter grades; 5 unexcused absences, lowers 3 letter grades. More than five unexcused absences could result in failure of the course.

In order not to disrupt the class, punctuality is required. Students are expected to be in class at the beginning of the class hour; any delay exceeding five minutes will be considered an absence.

Dates of mid-term and final exams cannot be changed for individual travel plans or personal needs. Students should take note of the dates and hours of the midterm and final exams and plan their trips after the last exam. It is important to inform friends and relatives about these exam dates so that no tickets are purchased for you that will interfere with these exam dates. Missing the midterm or the final exam could result in failure of the course.
